## Pick of the day

### Neil Gaiman's Likely Stories (Sky Arts, 9pm)

In the 1980s, Gaiman's dark fantasies would have made fine source material for ITV's Tales of the Unexpected, and that series has clearly influenced this four-part anthology — a pair of stories tonight, two more next week — written by Kevin Lehane and directed by the artists Iain Forsyth and Jane Pollard (best known for the Nick Cave documentary 20,000 Days on Earth). Jarvis Cocker provides the music.

In the first, Foreign Parts, George MacKay plays a companionless banker who appears to have picked up a venereal disease from a photocopier; in the second, Feeders and Eaters, Tom Hughes wanders into a late-night cafe with a tale about a mysterious woman (Rita Tushingham) who has a deep knowledge of fungi and a taste for raw meat. As well as providing the original short stories, Gaiman features in the background in both films,

possibly providing clues as to what they mean. *David Hutcheon*
